UNWTO General Assembly opens to Advance Big Plans for Tourism

The General Assembly of the World Tourism Organization has met for the 25th time in Samarkand, Uzbekistan. As its own data indicates that global tourism is on track to reach up to 95% of pre-pandemic levels by the end of this year, the Assembly brought sector leaders together to advance a clear vision for the long-term transformation of the sector around clear priorities.

Reflecting the broad diversity of the sector, delegations from 117 countries, including 70 Ministerial level representatives, came together for the meeting of the supreme organ of the UN specialized agency for tourism for development. Ahead of the opening plenary, UNWTO Secretary-General Zurab Pololikashvili had been formally welcomed to Samarkand by President of Uzbekistan Shavkat Mirziyoyev and commended his leadership in boosting levels of investment in the country's tourism sector and his focus on education and supporting jobs. for more information visit this link.

Opening the General Assembly, Mr Pololikashvili said: "This General Assembly represents a key moment for us as an organization and for tourism as a sector. We weathered the storm of the pandemic, and now have the opportunity to achieve the long-term transformation of the sector and leave a real legacy for global tourism."

On the eve of the Assembly, the Secretary-General had published his wide-landmark goal for the sector. "The Journey to 2030: A Vision for a Sector Transformed" sets out clear priorities for the sector in the year ahead and action plans for achieving them.

Aligning strategies addressing infrastructure, marketing, collaboration, innovation, education, legislation, and crisis management is essential to advancing ambitious objectives for tourism. When combined, these elements can support the tourist sector's steady expansion, boosting regional economies and giving visitors unique experiences. The long-term viability of tourism projects depends on close observation of development, flexible response to shifting market conditions, and perseverance in the face of difficulties.

Claudia Goldin: Shining a Noble Light on the Economics of Gender

Claudia Goldin is an American economist and the Henry Lee Professor of Economics and Lee and Ezpeleta Professor of Arts and Sciences at Harvard University. She is the third woman to win the Nobel Prize in Economics, which she received this year for her research on women

in the labour market. The third female economist to receive this award and the only one without it being shared. She is an American economic historian, who uncovered key drivers behind the gender pay gap. Goldin's work has been visionary and revolutionary in its analysis of the factors that have shaped women's participation in the labour force over time. She has shown that the gender gap in wages has narrowed remarkably in recent decades, but that women are still underrepresented in highpaying occupations and leadership positions. She has also shown that the increasing participation of women in the labour force has had a positive impact on the overall economy. Claudia Goldin is an eminent economist and social-economic historian who has made momentous contributions to understanding of the role of women in the workforce, the changing nature of work and family, and the long-run economic growth of the United States. Goldin's research has highlighted an expansive range of domains and issues, including:

- Shifting gender disparities in earnings and education.
- The importance of women in the labour force during World War II.
- The consequence and influence of technological change on the demand for labour.
- The economics of education and training.
- The long-run economic growth of the United States.

One of Goldin's most seminal contributions has been her work on the changing gender gap in earnings and education. In her book, "The Female Labour Force Participation: Theory and Evidence," she showed that the decline in female labour force participation in the early 20th century was not due to a decline in the demand for female labour, but rather to an increase in the opportunity cost of women's time. This increase in the opportunity cost of women's time was due to a few factors, including the increasing cost of childcare, the increasing importance of education for women, and the rise of the ideal of the fullhomemaker. Another important contribution of Goldin's work is her emphasis on the long-term perspective. She has shown that the gender wage gap has been a persistent problem throughout history and that it is not simply a product of recent changes in the economy. This finding suggests that the gap is rooted in deep-seated social and cultural norms and institutions. Her research has also been used to inform public policy, such as the development of childcare programs and policies to support women's labour force participation.

Another noted contribution of Goldin's work has been her research on the role of women in the labour force during World War II. In her book Women's Work in America: A History, she showed that women played a vital role in the war effort, filling jobs that had previously been

held by men. Goldin's work on women's labour force participation during World War II has helped to shed light on the important contributions that women make to the economy and has also helped to challenge traditional gender roles.

In addition to her work on gender and the labour force, Goldin has also made significant contributions to our understanding of the changing nature of work and family. In her book The Paradox of Declining Male Labour Force Participation, she showed that the decline in male labour force participation in recent decades is due to several factors, including the increasing importance of education for men, the rise of the ideal of the involved father, and the decline in the availability of good-paying manufacturing jobs. Goldin's work on the changing nature of work and family has helped us to understand the challenges that families face in balancing work and family life and has also helped to inform public policy debates on issues such as workfamily balance and the need for affordable childcare. Here are some specific examples of how Goldin's work has been used to inform public policy: Her research on the gender gap in earnings has been used to advocate for policies to reduce gender inequality, such as equal pay laws and childcare programs. Her research on women's labour force participation during World War II has been used to support policies that promote women's labour force participation, such as anti-discrimination laws and policies that support work-family balance. Her research on the changing nature of work and family has been used to inform public policy debates on issues such as work-family balance and the need for affordable childcare. Goldin's work has been praised for its rigour, its breadth, and its originality. She has used a wide range of data and methods to study the role of women in the labour market, and her findings have been widely cited by other scholars. Other two women Nobel prize winners in the economics field are Elinor Ostrom (2009) and Esther Duflo (2019).
